# Talking of pet subjects

**How do you know if your cat likes his food, or why your dog seems down in the dumps?**

According to animal communicator Amelia Kinkade, all you need to do is ask them.

Ms Kinkade, from Los Angeles, is in Leicester to teach people how to talk to their pets - and understand what they are trying to say back.

For £175, you can find out how to talk to the animals at two workshops held in the city this weekend.

Ms Kinkade, listed in a publication called Top 100 Psychics in America, is touring Britain to promote animal communication, which she said anyone can do, with practice.

She converses with animals by telepathy, transmitting pictures into their heads and reading the pictures they send back.

"You are learning to listen to your intuition. The more you listen, the better you get. It's about learning to trust your instincts. Communicating with animals is about learning

to develop that. If we ignore it, we do ourselves a disservice."

Ms Kinkade has been communicating with animals for 12 years, after attending a conference on the subject. She said all animals are trying to talk to people.

Ms Kinkade can help owners identify pets' medical problems as well as their likes and dislikes. Her

two-day seminar on Saturday and Sunday is the only one taking place in the Midlands.

Jo Cooper organised Ms Kinkade's Leicester workshops after reading her book. She said: "I bought it thinking it would be fun, not realising it was serious."

Ms Kinkade told Mrs Cooper her dog, Tasmin, was likely to have suffered at the hands of a large man, and did not like perfume.

Mrs Cooper confirmed she was

afraid of large men, and had been frightened of hands when she first went to live with the family. Her pet had also refused to let a friend, who was wearing perfume, in the car.
